Dr Rian van Antwerpen, SASRI Senior Soil Scientist, recently won the **Best Paper at Congress** prize (for a member older than 30 years) at the 2017 Combined Crops, Soils, Horticulture and Weeds Congress. His expertise in soil science primarily include water storage capacity of soils, soil salinity/sodicity, soil compaction, tillage practices, root distribution, sugarcane residue blankets, organic ameliorants and soil health.

In his spare time, Rian is quite the artisan as he enjoys restoring old tools, refurbishing furniture and dabbling in a bit of woodwork. He has many wonderful artefacts which he has collected and successfully restored over time. He also enjoys spending time with family and friends.
